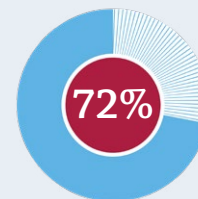
PLANT SALES

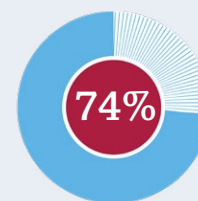
GARDENING WORKSHOPS

Look for more hands-on seasonal workshops and classes designed to provide information and tips for home, coastal, and native plant gardening.



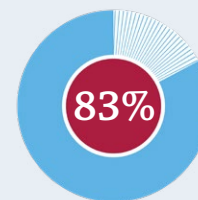
MUSIC

A newly installed roof allowed us to reopen the bathrooms adjacent to the Overlook Terrace. A new tractor, gator and trailer have significantly helped our small gardens team accomplish tasks necessary to maintain the Gardens' beauty.



PATH LIGHTING PROJECT

In April '22, we sent out an appeal for contributions to repair and replace 40 existing path lights, and to add more. Donors contributed over \$5400! With additional funding from the Cannon Foundation, we have installed 108 new lights to the Gardens' paths, and have upgraded our capacity to

increase this number in the future. With bright paths, we look forward to hosting more evening events and educational programs! Thank you!

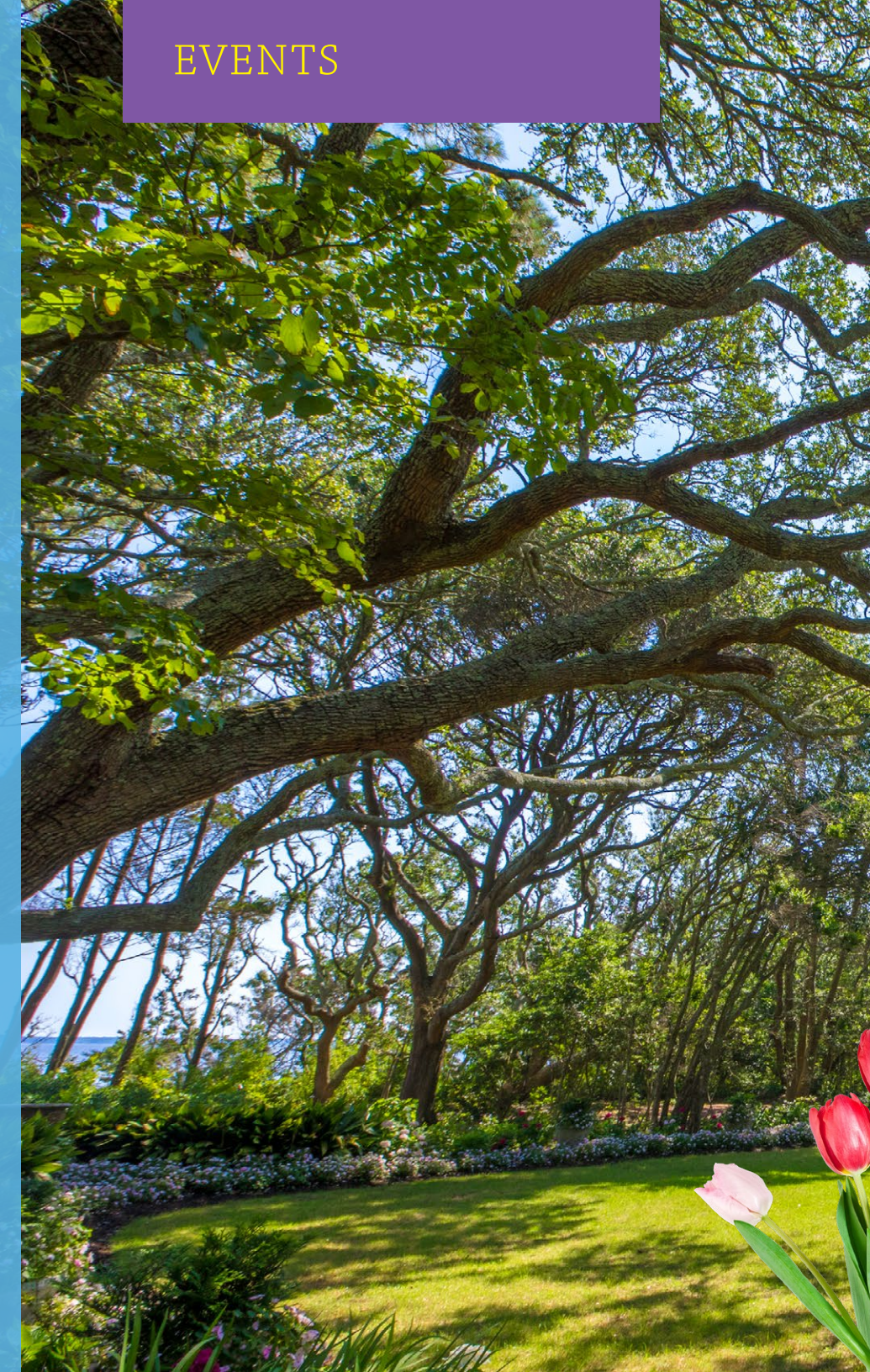


COLONIST BRICK PATH

TRIBUTE TO QUEEN ELIZABETH II

The Elizabethan Gardens released 70 butterflies, as a tribute to Queen Elizabeth II, on Tuesday, September 27th at 1:30 p.m. at the Great Lawn. The event was free to attendees with regular garden admission.

Queen Elizabeth II recognized the historical significance of Roanoke Island in 1984 on the 400th anniversary of the arrival of English explorers. Princess Anne represented the Queen and traveled to North Carolina to join the celebration, reflecting the Queen's

interest in the exploration and colonization of the Island. Princess Anne was interested in the design as well as the history of the Gardens. "She had a meeting with the head gardener and later sent him seeds for the herb garden," explained Gardens' Executive Director Theresa Armendarez. "Later, when the Gardens established the Rose Garden, the Gardens received the gift of a Queen Elizabeth Grandiflora Rose from Her Majesty which has thrived in the formal walled garden."

In 2021, the Gardens celebrated its 70th anniversary, paralleling the celebration of Queen Elizabeth's seventieth year on the throne. "We were pleased to have with us members of the North Carolina chapter of the Daughters of the British Empire who planted an oak at the Great Lawn in honor of the Queen's reign," said Gardens' Board President Linda Davenport. "With this special tribute, we joined all those in our country and beyond who celebrated her inspiration and achievements over 70 years as Queen."



EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMMING



PlantED is designed to inspire an appreciation of science as it relates to gardening, nature, and the environment.

We are off to a fantastic start with the hiring of a Programs Manager, and due to the generosity of the Keeney family, individual donations, and grants from Dominion Energy, the Cannon Foundation, and the Outer Banks Community Foundation, we are building capacity to support our efforts.

The new greenhouse - dedicated to Margaret French Keeney-Sterns - with additional funding from Dominion Energy for interactive displays and supplies - will allow us to educate children and adults about plants and their various uses. Funding from the Cannon Foundation to renovate the Discovery Cottage will provide newly designed indoor and outdoor classroom space. In addition, plans for the cottage garden will add sensory elements to enhance the experience for all visitors - which is being made possible by a grant from the Outer Banks Community Foundation.



EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMMING



Camp Discovery 2023 at the Elizabethan Gardens began Monday, June 26th! Campers enjoyed a fun-filled summer of nature-based games, activities, crafts, and more. The goal of our camp program is to foster appreciation and love for the environment through hands-on learning experiences.

2023-2024 Field Trip Programs

Program activities and schedule will be determined at the time of booking. We can create age-appropriate activities for your students' grade and age.

Life-Cycles

What is metamorphosis? In this program students will learn about life-cycles and what it means to be alive. Stations will include the life-cycle of butterflies, frogs, insects, and plants.



Plant Biology

What are the parts of a plant and why are they important? In this program students will learn the difference between animals and plants, discover photosynthesis, and explore the ways plants are important to sustain life on Earth.



Soil Science

Discover what is under our feet! In this program students will explore the composition and properties of soil. Students will identify decomposers and how they benefit the environment.



Teachers can lead students on a self-guided scavenger hunt to learn about the Gardens at their own pace, or choose one of three separate instructor-led programs; soil science, life-cycles, or plant biology. Our field trips give teachers the ability to supplement their curriculum and student learning in an outdoor setting with programs that are science-based and interactive. We look forward to welcoming teachers and students in 2023-2024.

FEBRUARY CAMELLIA TOURS & TEA TASTING

In 2022, the Gardens received news that it had been selected to be added to the list of the American Camellia Trail Gardens, a project of the American Camellia Society. American Camellia Trail gardens are public gardens containing notable collections of camellias. The Elizabethan Gardens joins as one of only four gardens on the trail in North Carolina. Our gardens currently have 124 novel cultivars of camellias on site. Early-season varieties begin blooming in autumn with later varieties blooming through April.

In February 2023, we opened to the public to highlight the Gardens' Camellias. A 45-minute guided tour provided information about Camellias, their uses in everyday life, and a chance to taste tea made from the Gardens' own Camellia plants. Join us for a tour next February!



EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMMING

STANLEY BEACHUM TALK

As part of the Gardens' 2023 Camellia celebration, Stanley Beacham met with a group of 30 visitors and discussed his work at the Gardens. After serving in the Coast Guard for 18 years, he took advantage of a government program offered to veterans to develop job skills. Stanley joined a program at what is now the Norfolk Botanical Gardens where he began his career as a horticulturist and worked across the region. He joined Superintendent Louis Midgette as a gardener at the Elizabethan Gardens and worked with him until Midgette's retirement, when Beacham became Superintendent. Among other aspects of the Gardens, he described the development of the Gardens' renowned camellia collection.



The Elizabethan Gardens has seen tremendous growth and expansion over its 72-year history, bringing an amazing array of features much to the delight of members and visitors.

The Colonist Brick Walk, which commemorates the original English colonists which landed on Roanoke Island, was installed in 2017. The Great Gates, a gift from the French Ambassador and an entry point to the Gardens, were restored that same year. The John White Butterfly Center and Children's Discovery Cottage were opened in early 2019. Both venues were designed to offer new opportunities for educational experiences.

And as mother nature nourishes the beauty of the earth, she can also be very forceful - in late 2019, Hurricane Dorian took its toll on the Gardens, destroying a greenhouse and causing over \$20,000 in damage. With the help of our dedicated staff, volunteers and many donations toward the recovery effort, we were up and running in less than a month.

Then Covid-19 hit in March of 2020, and the Gardens was closed for two months, with herculean efforts allowing plant sales by appointment; new covid protocols for employees and guests; an innovative timed ticketing process to control the numbers allowed in the Gardens and receipt of the Payroll Protection Plan funds to keep the staff working throughout the pandemic. Having to cancel events, programs

and planned work took a tremendous toll on the Garden's financial picture, but the good news was that contributions to the annual fund and new and renewed memberships grew. To adapt to the post-Covid world, the very successful Kentucky Derby Party of previous years became a Derby Party to Go; WinterLights was reimagined to allow socially distanced attendance; and the Gardens had a successful year because folks flocked to be in an outdoor, safe environment to enjoy the sanctuary and beauty.



In 2021, to celebrate the 70th year anniversary, the history of the Gardens was unveiled through a series of artistic panels displayed in Odom Hall to tell the story of the Garden Club of North Carolina's project — which started in 1951 and is now the Elizabethan Gardens. During the same year, the iconic Gazebo was moved to a safe location, saved from falling into the Sound as erosion continued to take away the Garden's shoreline. The Enchanted Faery Project created a visual and audio pathway through the Gardens,

as told by 12 ancient and fanciful faeries. The official 70-year anniversary was celebrated along with members of the North Carolina Daughters of the British Empire. Together our organizations celebrated the Garden's 70th Year along with our namesake, Queen Elizabeth's Jubilee 70th year.

The following year 2022, with generous donations and grants, an authentic English greenhouse was procured; new and improved pathway lighting was installed throughout the paths; out-of-service restrooms were repaired and reopened; entertainment events were introduced and an educational program manager was hired to enhance the focus on educational opportunities to be offered.

The Gardens is recognized as an ArbNet Level 2 arboretum, a member of the Camelia Society, an official stop on the Bluebird Trail and an excellent source of host plants for many butterfly species.

Under the exceptional leadership of Executive Directors Carl Curnutte and Theresa Armendarez, the amazing staff, volunteers, members, sponsors and donors, the Elizabethan Gardens has grown and will continue to thrive as a memorial to the past and a gateway to the future.

THE BUTTERFLY HIGHWAY

The Gardens is a “pollinator pitstop” along the North Carolina Wildlife Federation’s “Butterfly Highway.”

The Butterfly Highway is a statewide conservation restoration initiative that aims to restore native pollinator habitats to areas impacted by urbanization, land use change and agriculture across North Carolina.

AMERICAN CAMELLIA TRAIL GARDEN

American Camellia Trail gardens are public gardens containing notable collections of camellias. The Elizabethan Gardens joined this past year as one of only four gardens on the trail in North Carolina. We celebrated our collection this past February with tours and tea tastings - join us in February 2024!



NORTH CAROLINA BIRDING TRAIL
